A New Reformation

The last Sunday of October is the day in most Lutheran churches when we remember the Reformation, a time of great change in the church and society. The Reformation did more than form the Protestant church. Luther translated the entire Bible into German, which not only gave common people the chance to read and interpret the scriptures for themselves, but also helped to form the German language that we know today. The Reformation helped increase literacy amongst the population.



While the first Reformation happened over 500 years ago, we are a continually reforming church. Churches have changed over things such as which language to worship in or the role of women in the church (both in leadership positions and ordained ministry). Churches have reformed

around the nature of Holy Communion, whether infants can be baptized or not, and worship styles.

We find ourselves in a time of re-forming once again in the ELCA. A solitary rostered of Word and Service Ministers (Deacon) replaced three former roles in 2016. Deacons were first ordained in 2020, rather than commissioned for service.

Christ Lutheran may feel like it is going through its own mini-Reformation as we travel along the path of transition. Reformation can be an exciting time for some, yet scary and challenging for others. Although some things may be changing in our community of faith, our deep roots of worship, love for neighbor, and identity as children of God made in the image of God remains the same. May we all find peace in God's continual presence amongst us.




