# The value of silence

"The use of white space," a graphic artist will say, "is every bit as important as the use of word, color, or image. White becomes a color in its own right."

"Musical rests," musicians will agree, "speak every

bit as loudly as the notes that lie between them." "Silence – its amount and quality," the communications instructor advises, "has much to say about the words actually uttered."

White space. Rests. Silence.

If there is one time of the church year above all else in which white space, rests, and silence add texture to the depth of our liturgies, readings, and devotions it is during Lent.

The role of words and silence is best likened, for me, in a visit to Auschwitz. Auschwitz, the largest Nazi extermination camp in Poland, has come to represent evil and is often referred to as "the graveyard of the nations."

A visit to Auschwitz is all but devoid of words. Only at the gate is the visitor greeted with a brief spoken introduction. Then the silent walk begins. At one station, the visitor stands in a room filled to the ceiling with only human hair. The text is spartan . . . one sentence . . . enough for the sojourner to understand that this hair once bounced on the heads of innocent children giggling on a playground.

The visitor walks on. At the next station, the visitor stands in a room filled with a mountain of work shoes. The text? Another sentence only . . . enough to remind the visitor that these shoes hobbled elderly women toward their yet

The walk continues. The visitor stands in a room of only artificial limbs . . .

Words cannot describe the horror, nor should they try to. But select words focus the experience. Words, like careful lighting in a museum, bring out the essence of the experience.

This year during Lent, you will be invited – as you are every year in our liturgy – to the spiritual practices of selfexamination and repentance, prayer, fasting, and reading God's holy Word.

And this year, I want to invite you to punctuate your words and your practices with silence.

Contemplate the possibility of an open tomb for the one who is grieving. Consider the meaning of the 40 day journey in the desert for the one who is thirsting. Reflect on the meaning of 30 pieces of silver for the one in your life who has been betrayed.

Dear friends in Christ, may your Lenten journey be rich, and may you arrive at the Resurrection energized for service in Christ's holy name.
